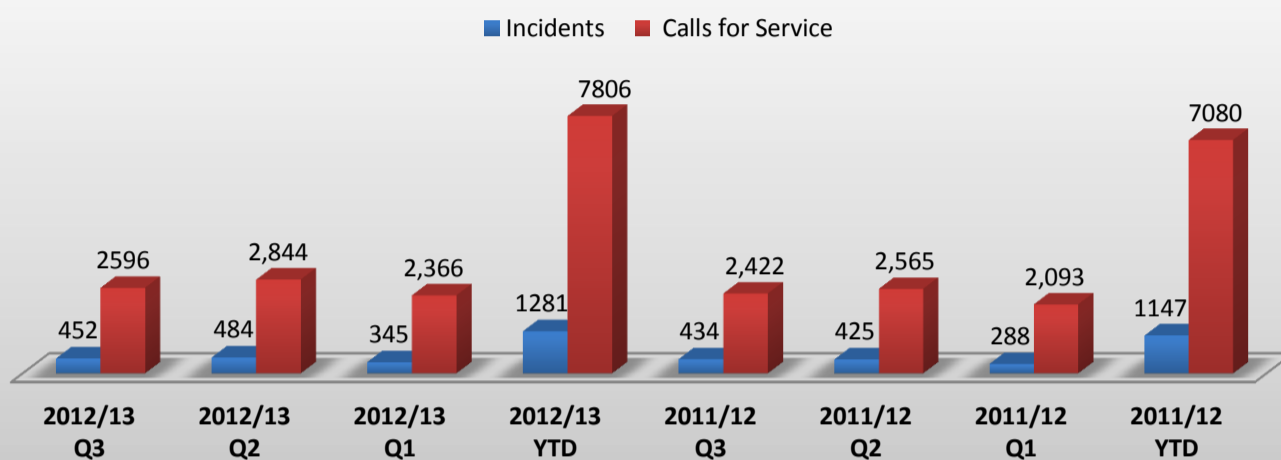
The number of incidents reported between May 1, 2012 and January 31, 2013 (YTD), increased by 12 percent to 1281 incidents, compared to 1147 incidents reported during the same period of 2011-2012.

The number of incidents reported in the third quarter of 2012-2013 (452) decreased by 7 percent, compared to the second quarter (484) of 2012-2013 and increased by 4 percent compared to the third quarter (434) of 2011-2012.

The number of Calls for Service reported in the third quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 9 percent to 2,596, compared to 2,844 Calls for Service in the second quarter of 2012-2013 and increased by 7 percent compared to the third quarter (2422) of 2011-2012.

The total number of Calls for Service (YTD) increased by 10 percent compared to the same period in 2011-2012.

The top five incident categories reported in the third quarter ranked as per the following: Theft Under \$5000 (Private Property), Emergency Medical, Fire Alarms, Mischief Under \$5000 (University Property) and Information. These top 5 incident report categories accounted for 57 percent (257) of all incidents reported (452) during this period.

The number of Theft Under \$5000 (Private Property) incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 20 percent to 86 incidents, compared to 107 incidents reported in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and they increased by 13 percent compared to the 3rd quarter (76) of 2011-2012.

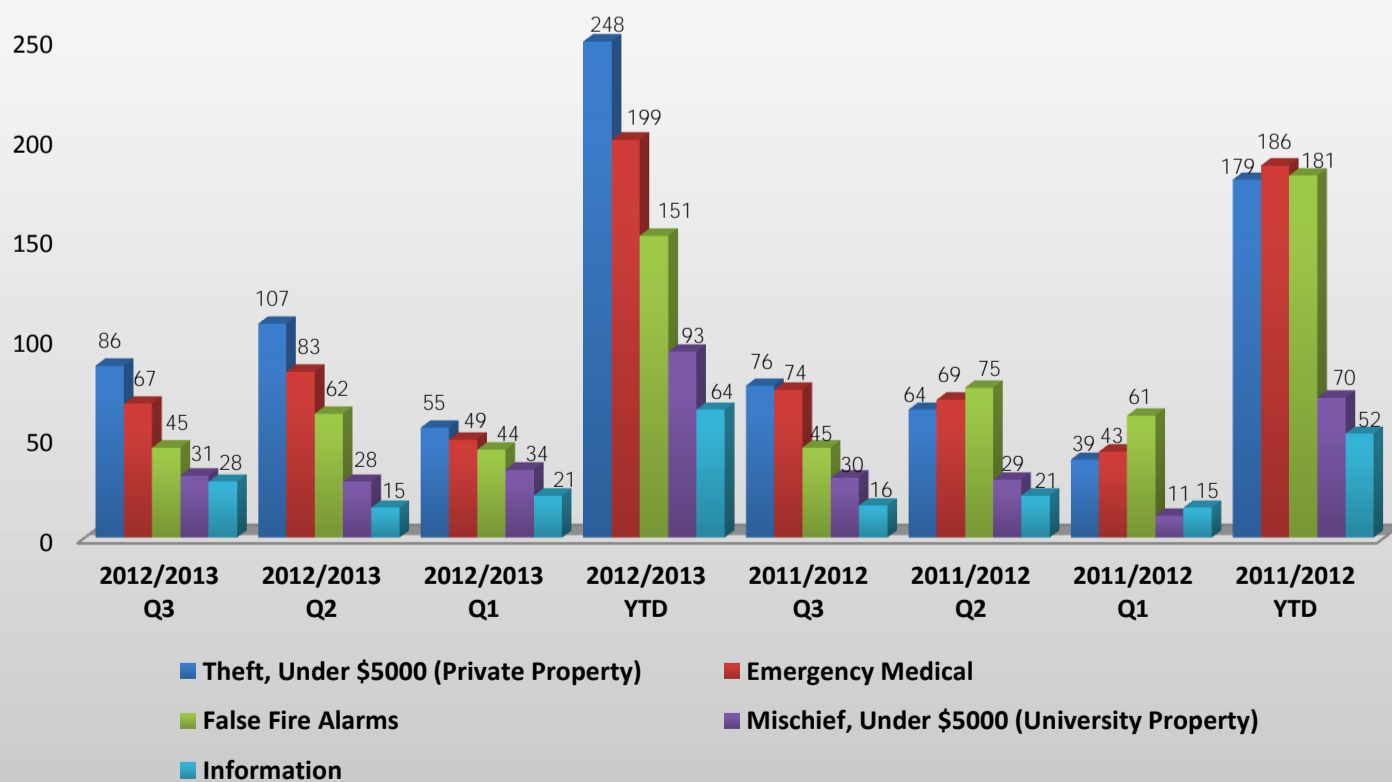
The number of Medical Emergency incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 19 percent to 67 incidents, compared to 83 incidents reported in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and they decreased by 9 percent compared to the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

The number of Fire Alarm incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 27 percent to 45 incidents, compared to 62 incidents in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013. A total of 45 Fire Alarm incidents were also reported in the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

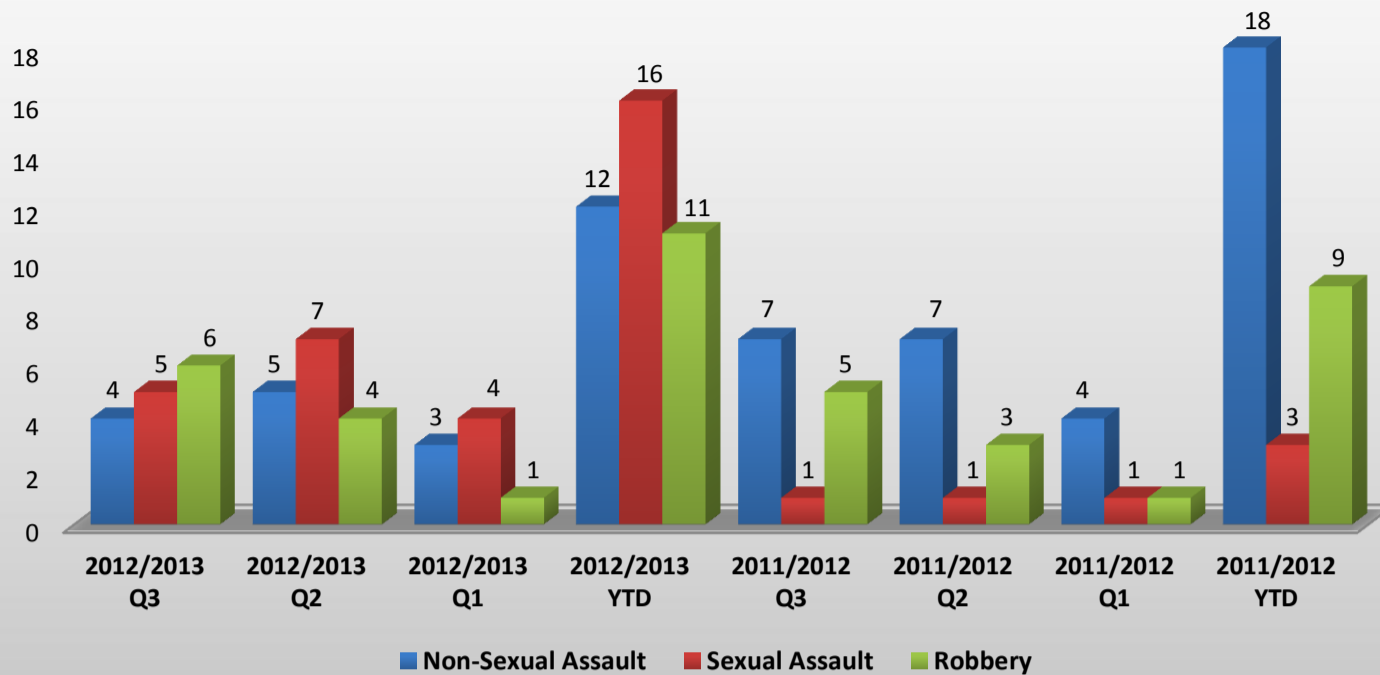
The number of Mischief Under \$5000 (University Property) incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 increased by 11 percent to 31 incidents, compared to 28 incidents in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and they increased less than 1 percent compared to the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

The number of Information/General Complaint incidents increased 87 percent in the 3rd quarter to 28, compared to 15 incidents reported in Q2.

### Selected Violent Crimes

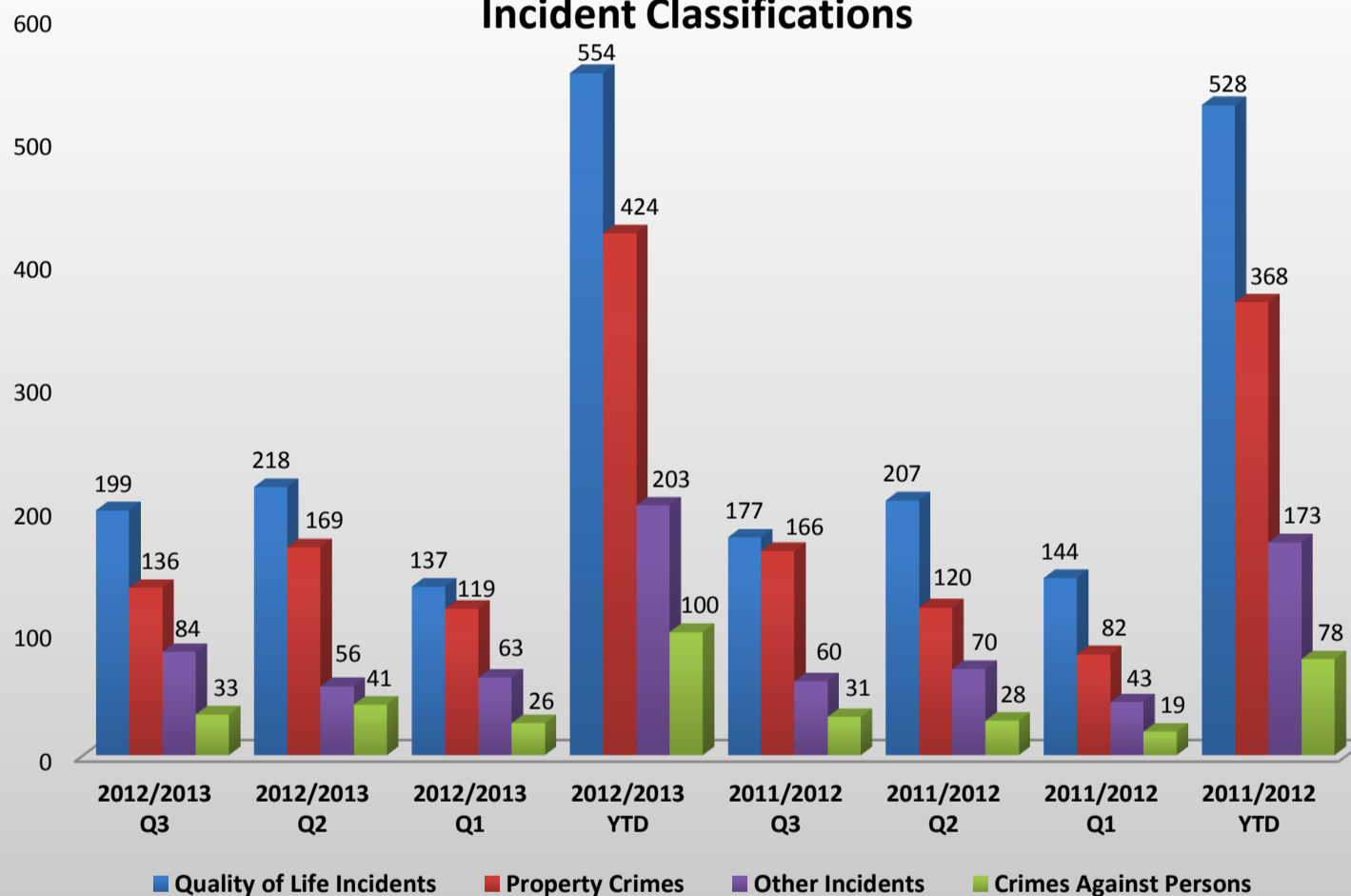


The number of Non-Sexual Assaults reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 20 percent to 4 incidents, compared to 5 incidents reported in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and they decreased by 43 percent compared to 7 incidents reported during the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

The number of Sexual Assault incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 28 percent to 5 incidents, compared to 7 incidents in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and increased by 400 percent compared to 1 incident reported during the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

The number of Robbery incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 increased by 50 percent to 6 incidents compared to 4 incidents during the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and increased by 20 percent compared to 5 incidents reported during the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

### Incident Classifications



The number of Quality of Life incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 9 percent to 199 incidents, compared to 218 incidents in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and they increased by 12 percent compared to 177 incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

The number of Property Crime incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 19 percent to 136 incidents, compared to 169 incidents in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and they decreased by 18 percent compared to 166 incidents in the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

The number of Crimes Against Persons incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 decreased by 19 percent to 33 incidents, compared to 41 incidents reported in the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013 and they increased by 6 percent compared to 31 incidents in the 3rd quarter of 2011-2012.

"Other" incidents reported in the 3rd quarter of 2012-2013 increased by 50 percent compared to the 2nd quarter of 2012-2013.

#### CLASSIFICATION DEFINITIONS:

**Incidents Affecting Quality of Life** Quality of Life incidents involve unlawful acts that are generally victimless in nature and do not pose a direct threat to an individual but have an impact as to the perception of safety, fear of crime and may cause disruptions to University business. They include bomb threats, disorderly behaviour, cause disturbance, smoking complaints, damage, emergency medicals, fire alarms, suspicious vehicles and person, trespassing, demonstrations, and hate incidents.

**Property Crimes** Property Crimes involve unlawful acts with respect to property but do not involve the use or threat of violence against a person. They included all break and enter, theft, arson, fraud and mischief categories.

**Crimes Against Persons** Crimes Against Persons incidents involve the application and/or threat of force to a person and include all sexual assaults, non-sexual assaults, harassment, homicide, abduction, indecent acts, intimidation, robbery, and uttering threats.

**Other Incidents** Other incidents include information and unfounded occurrences, hazardous substances, mental health act, and motor vehicle collisions, among others.
